Each year I ask the Headteachers from across the Trust to select their best news stories from the year to share in this annual newsletter. It is an excellent way to really celebrate all the amazing work that serves to inspire children and adults in our community. It also provides me with another opportunity to say a massive thank you to all the staff who make this magic happen, day in and day out.

Finally, this year, outcomes for pupils have begun to be published once more, enabling us to start seeing the picture of how well the schools in the Trust have done over the years of the Pandemic. It is excellent to see all of our primaries achieving above the national average combined score at KS2 this year for the first time and to see that both Saltash Community School and Liskeard School and Community College were in the top ten in terms of improving the progress of children at GCSE. We are looking forward to our latest results this coming summer.

I'm certain that next year will bring its own significant challenges but all our staff deserve enormous praise and recognition (and a relaxing break!) for responding with such energy, positivity and passion to the challenges of this year and for providing a rich set of opportunities for our young people, a small slice of which, you can read about in this newsletter.

Student Leaders across the Trust

We were also able to reward reliable student council members who had diligently asked questions each half term to their peers and feed these views back through the Trust student council to the Trustees, the Headteachers and the Governors. These discussions directly impacted on the work of the Trust and challenged our thinking about what motivated achievement at school. Trust Student Councillors also devised and ran excellent student led conferences in Dobwalls and in Looe, bringing together representatives from all schools in the Trust.

We have been incredibly fortunate to have had such excellent student leaders not only providing role models in their school but also in the opportunities they provide

for others. To illustrate this, a primary child spent most of a term finally convincing staff to let them set up and run a club for teaching computer coding. You might think this was so they could find somewhere to do their hobby at lunchtime but since the club started, they have not had time for coding themselves as they have spent the entire time teaching the younger members, a role that has inspired them even more than coding.



Collaborative Innovation in Education: Sharing Ideas for Enhanced Learning Experiences - A Case Study

Introduction:

In the ever-evolving landscape of education, the power of collaboration and knowledge sharing cannot be understated. Across schools and educational trusts, education practitioners are coming together to share ideas and best practices, leading to enhanced learning experiences for students. By breaking down experiments into manageable steps and providing hands-on activities, Debbie aimed to improve the quality of practical lessons and boost the confidence of staff members. Her goal was to ensure that students received accurate information and build their confidence and understanding of the subject. Debbie's inspiration came from her personal struggles with physics and her desire to make practical lessons more accessible to all staff members. She plans to continue sharing her ideas at future SMART Day events, fostering confidence-building sessions for support staff..

Innovative Solutions for Practical Experiments - Eunice O'Connell:


Inspired by Debbie Drinkell's session, Eunice O'Connell, science technician at Looe Community Academy, introduced an innovative idea to replace traditional dimple trays with laminated sheets for practical experiments. The laminated sheets offered advantages such as larger size, easier observation of reactions, and cost-effective replacements. By implementing this idea, Eunice experienced significant time saving, improved efficiency, and enhanced learning experiences for students. The positive impact of this idea has led Eunice to consider further development and the potential for sharing her findings with colleagues. The introduction of laminated sheets revolutionised practical experiments at Looe Community Academy and exemplified the power of collaboration and knowledge sharing within the scientific community.

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
Year 8 Students' celebration of International Women in Engineering Day!

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Celebrating a Successful Year with the Brilliant Club!


We are proud to highlight the achievements of our students in their inaugural year with the Brilliant Club at Saltash Community School. Their hard work and dedication have yielded exceptional results.


